


Secondary zip codes where the most students come from: 68108, 68117, 68147



45% of all students identify as Latino. more than our Caucasian student population


## **Comparing OCSC zip code data to that of Douglas & Sarpy Counties** outside of these zip codes

## **SCHOOL SNAPSHOTS**

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### **Dual Language Academy**



- The DLA enjoyed its first year at its new location inside St. Joan of Arc Catholic School, collaborating with SJA on many projects.
- A new "Guadalupanos" choir formed, composed of 2nd and 3rd graders learning songs in Spanish, led by a volunteer mariachi band member! The students performed at a bilingual school Mass honoring Our Lady of Guadalupe in front of peers and family members.

### **Holy Cross**



- Students participated in a school-wide program where they prayed for Omaha Police officers throughout the year. This is in addition to the many other ways children learned about Christ's love and the power of prayer.
- Holy Cross expanded its early childhood program to include a five-day, full-day option. Test scores show higher scores for our kindergarten students who attended pre-K compared with those who did not.



## TEST SCORES SHOW GROWTH ACROSS OUR SCHOOLS

Our schools utilize STAR Assessments, administered multiple times per year, to pinpoint skills that each student is ready to learn next, allowing teachers to personalize learning for each student's unique educational needs.

We are proud to show that nearly all grades 3-8 grew in their grade level knowledge in both reading and math. It's also important to note that student scores align very closely with overall archdiocesan averages.



## SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING

Academic performance is one measure of success, but the overall well being of each child is our main priority.

Students have access to Licensed Mental Health Care Providers from Catholic Charities at all six schools on a regular basis.

We also have a counselor on staff who can help students express and process emotions and anxiety, resolve peer conflicts and issues at home.

She established a First Friday Adoration for each class, and a Bible study course she took resulted in the creation of Prophetic Ministries at **St. Bernadette**. Several times a year the school community gathers to pray the rosary, led by 8th graders. Lynn's favorites include the light stick rosary and cupcake rosary.

She is open to new ideas from staff and students, brainstorming ways to make **St. Bernadette** the best learning environment it can be. Under her leadership, the school has acquired State of Nebraska Accreditation and an International Accreditation, Cognia. She has implemented Positive Behavioral




# **ENROLLMENT TRENDS**


## **ENROLLMENT TOTALS**



We hope to broaden our base of support. *Together in Christ* gifts this year will be directly invested in the following:







## **MIKE TIMMINS**

Senior Vice President & Chief Financial Officer - Education Quest Foundation Holy Cross Alum - K-8, Class of 1973

### What did you like about your teachers? Anyone who stood out?

The teachers, lay and Catholic sisters, were passionate and personable. What I remember most about my first grade teacher was her daily class reading of *Charlotte's Web* using a different animated voice for each character. Other favorites include Ms. Malm in second grade, Ms. Eleffson in fifth grade, and Mr. Michal Cain and Ms. Mary Ann Green in eighth grade.



### What were the most useful classes you took or clubs you belonged to?

Math and religion classes have been the most useful in my lifetime. In terms of extracurricular activities, I learned teamwork, sportsmanship and humility while participating in school sports. I especially learned a reverent respect and appreciation for the Mass and the Eucharist while assisting the priests as an altar server with my friend Joe Laird.

### How did Holy Cross prepare you for what you're doing now? What are you doing now?

I'm currently the CFO for EducationQuest Foundation in Lincoln, NE. The math I learned and enjoyed at Holy Cross sparked an interest to study accounting in college. Ultimately, my accounting degree put me on my career path in the finance and accounting field. Since my days at Holy Cross, my Catholic faith continues to grow and mature. After marrying young and suffering through an unwanted divorce in my mid-twenties, my faith and my family were my biggest source of strength. The more I healed, the more I began to realize and understand that "my" life plans were not necessarily God's plan. In fact, once I was able to reflect with several years of hindsight, God's plan was revealed to be much better than my own. This revelation inspired me to use my personal divorce experience to support other Catholics suffering divorce. Currently, I facilitate a program for the Lincoln Diocese called Surviving Divorce: Hope and Healing for the Catholic Family. I also lead the Divorce Ministry at St. Peter's in Lincoln.
