EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE



The Omaha Catholic School Consortium was launched 10 years ago with one of its key objectives being to keep Catholic education in southeast Omaha affordable and sustainable for generations to come. Much has been accomplished during those 10 years including continued support from the 16 Consortium parishes, growing enrollment from just over 1,400 to nearly 1,700, refreshing nearly all of our curriculum, opening the Dual Language Academy, weathering the impact of the pandemic and launching our *Creating Bright Futures in Christ* campaign.

The Campaign's primary objective is to solidify the future of our Consortium schools. The goals of the campaign are threefold: increasing salaries for our dedicated teachers and staff, establishing a fund to support maintaining our character filled but aging buildings and providing for further tuition assistance. 



SCHOOL SNAPSHOTS



Dual Language Academy *Established 2018*





- The DLA is home to 11 bilingual staff members, from multiple different countries. The school has been successful working with the Nebraska Department of Education to help visiting teachers from other countries obtain a Nebraska teaching certificate. This has helped maintain the 90:10 immersion model, in which 90% of the day's instruction is completed in Spanish, with the remainder in English for preschool through fourth grade.
- A House system was established last year, with 8 different houses to which students belong.
 A House system empowers all students to lead and belong. Everyone got to play and pray
 together in a multi-grade community, fostering positive peer-to-peer growth academically,
 socially and spiritually.

- The Outdoor Spaces Committee worked hard last year, including the construction and upkeep
 of a pollinator garden as well as securing over \$25,000 in donated materials, labor and plants to
 renovate outdoor spaces and completely renovate the interior courtyard. Parents and others in
 the community also came together to help with the demolition and repair of the gym when the
 bleachers and other areas were damaged by a storm.
- Faith-based activities abound at Holy Cross! Each grade celebrates a weekly Mass and enjoys prayers in their classrooms to start the day, at lunch and at the end of the day. Each classroom also features a prayer corner that students can utilize to build their relationship with Jesus.

- The entire OLL school community, including students, teachers and parents participated in an all-school book program.
- OLL teachers make accommodations to classroom instruction to meet the educational needs of all students. While much of the differentiation happens at the classroom level, Title 1 teachers also assist students who qualify for additional help in the areas of math and reading K-8th. Ten percent of OLL students received Title 1 support last year.

- Middle school grades 5-8 account for 41% of the total student enrollment, and continue to serve as role models for younger grades through their leadership and service. In particular, 22 of the eighth graders received scholarships for Catholic high school.
- SBS spent another year, 12 years running, supporting the ArchOmaha seminarians through special projects and prayers. Last year, one seminarian even sent a video message to students from St. Peter's Square in Rome!

- Last year, SPP implemented a new C.A.S.A.S Middle School Homeroom program for grades 6-8. The
 C.A.S.A.S system builds a sense of spirit, belonging and personal relationships. Each house grouping is
 named after a Saint and has its own motto and t-shirt. Every month there is a "House Competition" to
 challenge the students' knowledge, creativity, problem solving skills and teamwork. Students also plan
 and complete service projects.

- Of the 45 eighth grade graduates from the class of 2023, 78% of the students moved on to local Catholic high schools! A special shout out goes to Maia Arlen for achieving the highest score on the 8th Grade Entrance Exam, earning a scholarship to Skutt Catholic High School! We know you will do great things!
- The STM Summer Camp program expanded to include students PreK-7th grade. Students and their families chose between various weekly themes to receive continued learning in areas such as: science, cooking, art, nature, photography, theater, STEM and more.

Our schools are filled with all types of learners from zip codes all across the Metro. We were proud to introduce a new math curriculum in the 2022-2023 school year, which we believe will help students succeed academically and thrive as critical thinkers in their future endeavors.

ABOUT THE CURRICULUM

After a selection process that included a group of math teachers and school administrators, IntoMATH was selected as the new K-5 curriculum and Carnegie Math for the middle school grades. These two were selected because they align with current math education standards and because materials are based on the science about how we learn.

Two math coaches helped teachers at each school implement the new materials and supported them with the best instructional practices, making sure what we're doing aligns with current standards.

WHAT'S DIFFERENT

In the classroom, students learn together in a collaborative classroom model where teachers act as guides as students actively and critically think, reason mathematically and learn from each other.

Fewer math drills and step-by-step instruction happens now, and the students experience an approach that helps them truly learn and understand math concepts more deeply, rather than simply memorizing.

Parents have found this new instructional approach to be different from what they are used to, but it's all for the good.

Typically it is too early to see results after one year, but we are excited for the future. There has been demonstrated growth after the past several years working on reading improvement and now the data leads us to focus on math.


Science and social studies revisions are now underway.






ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Our schools utilize STAR Assessments, administered multiple times per year, to pinpoint skills that each student is ready to learn next, allowing teachers to personalize learning for each student's unique educational needs.

Test score averages across all schools show growth in the areas of both reading and math.

FAMILY FEATURES

FOUR IN ONE FAMILY FIND FAITH, COMMUNITY AT ST. BERNADETTE

Holly Inserra is now in her second year as preschool teacher at **St. Bernadette.** Last school year is one that she will never forget, and a time that she says has God's fingerprints all over it.

She and her family were in a tough spot around that time parenting two boys at home. Her youngest son, Perry, struggled with mental health and other issues. Holly decided that a change in school setting could be the answer.

The family was not Catholic, but they had recently moved to the Bellevue area near **St. Bernadette**, and after meeting Lynn Schultz, school principal, they felt it would be the perfect place for Perry.

Holly says Perry struggled at first, and the staff response was amazing.



"The entire school welcomed him and loved him. It was a lot different from our former school...just a different form of care."

It didn't take long after that for Perry to come home saying how much he loved spending time with God and going to Mass. That's when Holly realized that was what the whole family was missing.

As soon as she could, she enrolled herself and Perry, along with her husband and Perry's older brother, Ramon, in RCIA at St. Bernadette. When it came time to choose a sponsor for herself, Lynn Schultz came to mind immediately.

Last Spring, Ramon was able to be baptized and confirmed with his eighth grade class at an all-school Mass.

Then, at the Easter Vigil, she says members of her husband's extended family with whom they had lost contact showed up in support, and the occasion helped reconnect them.

"The beauty and peace of the day we entered the Church served as a first step in reconciling as a family. We felt God wanted us to move forward."

Reflecting on her experience, Holly wants to remind everyone that everything happens in God's timing. "Just stop, take time to listen, and you will know what God wants for you. For so many years, I was listening to everything else but that."

For Holly, part of God's plan included her hearing about a preschool teacher job opening at SBS. She worked as a para at other school districts previously and felt this was a good time to transition.

We asked Holly about her experience as a teacher in our schools.

"I love seeing students grow, from beginning to end of the year. I love their questions and their curiosity. I love being Catholic. I am able to share my faith at school and able to talk about Jesus and start every morning with prayer."

MEET ESTELA RANGEL

If Estela's name sounds familiar, it's because she has worked as a friendly face and voice on the phone inside the school office at **Sts. Peter and Paul** since 2013. Prior to SPP, she worked at Assumption and in many roles within Catholic schools dating back to 1996.

Estela was born in Mexico and immigrated to South Omaha in the 1990s, with only minimal English skills at the time. She was quickly welcomed by her neighbor, who helped her learn the language and who remains a friend today.

Now, Estela has four children and nine grandchildren. She is fortunate to see three of her grandchildren every day, as they not only live with her, they are also enrolled at the school.

But she didn't always think this could be a possibility.

She says the tuition assistance her family receives is the only reason it is. And she says she knows that to be true for many of the other families who attend SPP.

"I'm so glad for financial assistance. Catholic education is so important to me because of the values, respect and faith that the kids learn."

Now in her 28th year working in Catholic education, she is a staple and great resource to the Hispanic community at SPP and beyond. "I'm always thanking God because I love helping families," she says.

MEET THE TOOLEY FAMILY



Kelsea and Jake are the proud parents of two **Holy Cross** students. Although initially attracted to Holy Cross because of its convenient location, they decided to enroll after an impressive visit to the Early Childhood Education program in 2019.

"Our kids have thrived in their early education classes. Academically, both girls have impressed us with their abilities. Our youngest is already connecting letters and sounding out words she sees around her. I like that they aren't just regurgitating facts or memorizing instructions – they're being encouraged to think out their math problems or make connections in a science lesson."

Kelsea and Jake hold the strong sense of community at Holy Cross in high regard. This is also true for their daughters, one of whom, Maura, said, "My favorite thing about Holy Cross is all the different classes like Art and Library. My teacher and principal are very funny and make me smile."

"From the principal down to the volunteer lunch helpers, the community at Holy Cross is committed to the children entrusted in their care. It's a wonderful feeling knowing you're sending your kids to school at a place where they're cared for sincerely."

Beyond the caring community, our early childhood educators use creative teaching methods, such as play-based learning, project-based learning and technology integration to nurture each child's innate curiosity and love for learning. As a result, the kindergarteners who were previously enrolled in our Pre-K programs consistently demonstrate higher academic performance and test scores when tested in Kindergarten, paving the way for their success from the start.

Tamyra Hower is the Pre-K teacher and director of the Pawprints Preschool program at **St. Thomas More.** Before teaching early childhood education, Tamyra was a neonatal and labor and delivery nurse. She has been at STM now for 19 years. She says the biggest thing she wants to instill in the children she teaches is to treat others the way they want to be treated. "I love their laughter, their sincerity and just watching them grow," she says. About her, coworkers say her teaching ability is a gift from God. "Tamyra truly loves each student as her own, which drives her desire to see them succeed academically, socially and spiritually."

Q: What's your favorite part of your job?

A: Building relationships with the kids is my favorite part, for sure. It has also been really exciting to hire more incredible teachers and build a powerful staff. Something that our community has been especially excited about is the addition of a full-time librarian, who is a great resource for all.

Q: What was something that surprised you about your first year?

A: Something I noticed right from the start was how well the kids behaved. I was impressed with their manners and how the students interacted with the adults in the building.

Q: Do you have a favorite memory from the 2022-2023 school year?

A: The eighth grade class of 2023 was a special group of kids. I had never worked in a school with junior high kids, and they proved themselves to be fun, responsible, respectful and FULL of faith. Our staff was able to trust them to help out with a lot of different things, including leading a Day of Service and being excellent role models in faith.

Q: What is something about the Consortium in particular you appreciate?

A: We have a strong leadership team. The principals collaborate, and I appreciate the instructional support from our Education Director and Math Coach. This past year, our organization experienced a huge jump in getting curriculum and strategies in place.

Q: What are you looking forward to about year two and beyond?

A: Watching our staff implement the new curriculum has been great and I look forward to more of that. I am also excited that I now have experience on showing the community how to keep God in every single day and use my role to help shepherd their faith. We developed a new spirituality committee this year, which will extend the messages from Mass and offer more opportunities to encourage students in their faith.



ENROLLMENT TRENDS




ENROLLMENT TOTALS


ALL CONSORTIUM SCHOOLS (PRE-SCHOOL THROUGH 8TH GRADE)

(BASED ON 2022-2023 SCHOOL YEAR DATA)







Established in 2014, the *Together in Christ* **Annual Fund giving is a financial priority for our schools.** It is a tax-deductible opportunity for donors to help make a difference in the future of the Consortium. Gifts are unrestricted and added to the budget for all six schools to meet operating expenses, enhance the programs and services offered to students and maintain the school building.

Ways the Annual Fund helped this year:

- Operational dollars: Offset the difference between the cost of tuition and the
 cost to educate each student. Each family contributes financially at a level
 appropriate to their situation, and a gap still remains.
- Tuition Assistance: Your generosity allows us to extend tuition discounts to
 families who demonstrate significant financial need. The tuition assistance
 program makes a direct impact on students' ability to continue to pursue their
 Catholic education with us. Forty-three percent of families enrolled in our
 schools receive some form of financial assistance.

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

BISHOP JOHN FOLDA

Diocese of Fargo St. Thomas More Class of 1975 He was ordained a priest in Lincoln, Nebraska on May 27, 1989, and as a bishop in Fargo, North Dakota on June 19, 2013. His family all live in the Midwest, and his brother and sister also graduated from **St. Thomas More**.

Bishop Folda says he loved Catholic school because it was entirely built around our Catholic faith. He said his teachers and friends were wonderful, and being a student at the school brought him more deeply into the life of the parish.

Speaking of the wonderful teachers, Bishop Folda especially remembered fourth-grade teacher, Mrs. Langenfeld. "She made me really want to learn. Her classroom was a joyful place!"

- St. Thomas More School from 1st through 8th grades (1968 to 1975)
- Archbishop Ryan High School (1975 to 1979)
- University of Nebraska Lincoln (1979 1983)
- St. Charles Seminary, Philadelphia (1983 1989)
- Pontifical University of St. Thomas, Rome (1991-1993)

"I received a wonderful education in our Catholic faith at St. Thomas More. Faith was always important to my family, and the faith formation at STM planted many of the seeds that led to my future vocation as a priest. Now that I am the Bishop of the Diocese of Fargo, I can speak from my own Catholic school experience to all of our students, families and teachers about the beauty and value of a Catholic education," he says.

Fun fact: Bishop Folda was the first new bishop appointed by Pope Francis in the United States, after receiving notification on March 26, 2013, just two weeks after Pope Francis was elected.

He shares his gratitude for all who support St. Thomas More School saying, "I was blessed to be a student there, and I hope it continues to serve students and families for many years to come!"
