- Enrollment: Recent enrollment is stable, but our goal is to grow to welcome more students into our schools—not just for financial stability but to strengthen our community.
- Financial Stewardship: We have used reserves to cover necessary expenses over the last four years. These funds are crucial and set aside to address long-term stability and strategic growth.

BOLD STEPS FOR A STABLE AND SECURE FUTURE:

- **Development Efforts:** By expanding outreach to grow our support network, we increased supporters by 34% in 2023-2024 and believe this growth will continue.
- Recruitment and Retention: Filling our schools to capacity is essential—not just financially but because it aligns with our mission to educate more children for a better world.
- Investing in Teachers: We're committed to attracting and retaining top educators by increasing salaries and enhancing professional development.

Our success, which you will read about throughout this report, is thanks to the many individuals who have supported us since the Consortium's founding. I'm proud that so many more are joining us.

I am deeply grateful to our Board for their wisdom, our staff for their daily inspiration and our families and supporters for believing in our mission. Together, we are building a brighter future for our students and Catholic education in southeast Omaha.






ENROLLMENT TOTALS

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE ACHIEVING NEW HEIGHTS WITH NEW CURRICULUM

A major academic highlight from the 2023-2024 school year was Consortium students achieving the highest ever reading average score on their STAR assessments.

The increased percentage of students meeting proficiency standards is the highest in any period since the schools began using STAR testing, which they take three times throughout the school year to measure progress in various content areas.



This means that at least 6 out of every 10 Consortium students can read at or above their grade level!

Part of the reason for the reading test score growth is due to the implementation of the new English Language Arts (ELA) curriculum last year. Teachers were trained on the "Science of Reading" and have implemented new strategies to help students.


We also implemented new Social Studies and Science curricula across all six schools. This allows for easier collaboration between teachers and a more seamless student and family experience, better aligned to district and state standards.

Between the ELA, Science and Social Studies curriculum, \$710,269 was invested in new materials, purchased with the assistance of federal funding.

During the Fall STAR testing in the current school year, about a quarter of students scored at 80 percentile or above, which is a very impressive way to kick off year two of continued progress."

SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING POSITIVE PEER RELATIONSHIPS FOSTER EMOTIONAL GROWTH


Beyond academic success, our schools focus on the holistic development of each student. Since 2021, data related to student mindsets, behaviors and attitudes related to success in school and beyond the classroom has been measured through a questionnaire administered at multiple times per year--the Panorama survey. The surveys are designed to help educators understand the social-emotional competencies of their students and how they are supported in classrooms and schools.

As of Spring 2024, **90.5% of Consortium students** report positive and supportive relationships as part of their daily school experience. This is a 2% increase in two years.

The 2023-2024 school year also saw an over 3% increase in the number of students who report positive emotional regulation skills. Modeling and teaching effective tools to help students manage their feelings and stay calm when upset, make good decisions when angry and feel better when sad is important to our school administrators, especially as mental health issues and anxiety continue to rise in young adults.

Since beginning the surveys in the 2021-2022 school year, 88% or greater of Consortium students report supportive relationships in schools.

In the 2024-2025 school year, all six schools are implementing a new curriculum for social-emotional learning (SEL) called Friendzy. The Friendzy program provides a Biblical, social, emotional and academic framework for PreK-8 classrooms that teaches skills like respect, confidence, problem solving and communication skills.





SUPPORTIVE CULTURE COMMUNITY AND COLLABORATION ARE KEYS TO CONSORTIUM SUCCESS

At a time when teacher retention rates across the nation remain low, and many schools across the state have unfilled positions, Consortium schools stand out with a 92% teacher retention rate coming into the 2024-2025 school year.

This statistic is a testament to the supportive and resource-rich environment that the Consortium fosters for educators.

By prioritizing a culture of encouragement and continuous professional development, the Consortium schools strive to be places where teachers feel valued, inspired and equipped to deliver exceptional educational experiences.

Something new within recent years is the addition of two assistant directors of education, who assist school leaders and teachers at all buildings.

"One of our main goals is to ensure all teachers have everything they need to support students-materials, technology and training," said Casey Wildman, Asst. Director of Education.

Their support includes new teacher training, grade book set up and facilitation of resource sharing between staff.

For the 2024-2025 school year, we adjusted the school year calendar to build in extra work time for teacher collaboration.

"This is important work. We will have time to look at what students are learning and how we know they are learning those concepts, then strategize on moving forward," said Wildman.

The Consortium believes this investment in resources enhances teaching quality and ensures that teachers feel confident and empowered in their roles. It's this unique blend of support and resources that makes the Consortium stand out, ensuring that our highly qualified staff teams remain dedicated and passionate about their mission.

We are also pleased to offer a 13% raise to educators, which began in August. The increase was funded by the generosity of those who support our Creating Bright Futures in Christ Campaign.



PREPARED FOR THE FUTURE LOYOLA SCHOLARS PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT

Creighton Prep's Loyola Scholars Program began in 2016, and since then, 45 Consortium students have been selected to participate.

Loyola Scholars is a three-year program for academically talented middle school boys in Omaha. The program prepares them for future academic and social success.

Each year, school leaders submit student nominations to Creighton Prep, from which approximately 15-18 students are selected for the competitive three-year program during their sixth-eighth grade years.

In addition to being nominated, students and their families must apply and then interview with Creighton Prep program representatives as part of the process; family support is a major element in each Scholar's success. Upon selection, the Loyola Scholars program kicks off in June, and each student comes to Creighton Prep throughout the weekdays for breakfast, lunch, academic studies and a range of activities designed to help each participant grow in their classroom confidence, interpersonal skills, faith development and more. During the school year, the group gathers monthly on various Saturdays for continued formation.

Upon successful admission to Creighton Prep as an eighth grade student, graduates of the Loyola Scholars program earn a full-tuition scholarship to cover the costs to attend Creighton Prep. This is made possible by the generosity of the Heider Family Foundation.



"To me, a Lovola Scholar means to be a student who engages with their classmates and has a great work ethic. This has influenced my life a lot, as this has helped me make new friends, get better grades and have a lot of fun. I want to dedicate myself to God more so that I can best live out his plan for me." - Tobby O.





Fun fact: His parents also graduated from OLL, as well as his four siblings and two nephews. His niece is also in 7th grade this year!

Enjoy this Q&A below with Fr. Eckley about his Catholic school experience.

Q: What did you like about your teachers?

A: The teachers that I had challenged us to do our best. They did this always in a loving and caring way. Sr. Lisa in 3rd grade is an example of this. My family moved back to Omaha from Fremont and I transferred into OLL after Thanksgiving. Sr. Lisa helped me feel welcomed and part of the class. She also didn't allow me to get away with anything and challenged me to do my best.

Q: What were the most useful classes you took or clubs you belonged to?

A: Playing on school sports teams during my time at OLL solidified the friendships from school with a group of guys that I'm friends with now, 45 years later.

Q: How did your Catholic grade school prepare you for your work now?

A: I didn't realize at the time that I was learning and growing in my faith through the classes, the example of our teachers and the daily living of the faith during school. When I started as a freshman at Gross Catholic High School, we were given a test on the foundations of the Catholic faith. The two highest scores in the class of 300 were me and a classmate from OLL.


Q: Do you have a favorite memory you can share?

A: Each year in middle school, we had a science fair. We came up with our own idea and displayed it. In eighth grade, I won second place, along with a classmate on the effects of alcohol on the body.

Q: What would you say to a family considering Catholic education for the first time? (aka - In your own words, what is the value of Catholic education?)

A: Our Catholic Schools provide excellent academics and formation of the whole child. In the Catholic school environment, a student grows daily in their knowledge of the faith and their relationship with Jesus. This is lived out daily in the classroom, modeled by the staff and put into practice through service to each other and those beyond the school.

Fr. Eckley is one of several other local priests who graduated from Consortium schools. We hope there will be many more to come!
